Teaching Vocational Exploration

A Seminar for NetVUE Faculty Members • June 13–17, 2022

he Council of Independent Colleges (CIC) is pleased to offer a multidisciplinary seminar, Teaching Vocational Exploration, for full-time faculty members at the assistant or associate professor level in all fields at colleges and universities that are members of the Network for Vocation in Undergraduate Education (NetVUE). Participants will learn to strengthen the teaching of vocational exploration by probing a variety of understandings of vocation and their importance in educating undergraduates, by developing new courses or course materials or redesigning existing courses, and by establishing a broader network of faculty members committed to teaching vocational exploration. Thanks to a generous grant from Lilly Endowment Inc., CIC will cover most costs of participation (including travel) for those faculty members who are selected.

One of the most promising ways that faculty members can serve their students is to introduce them to the subject of vocation. What would it mean for students to think of themselves as "called" or "summoned" to use their intellect and abilities to have an impact on the world? Faculty members have the opportunity to guide students in the exploration of their respective callings and to help them probe questions of meaning, purpose, and identity, as well as consider contributions that they can make to society. This work can expand, deepen, and enrich faculty members' understanding of the privilege and responsibility of their own callings as teachers.

This seminar aims to strengthen the teaching of vocational exploration by examining different meanings of vocation and their importance for undergraduate education, by considering content and teaching methods for courses that focus on vocational exploration, and by reflecting on the shape and experience of the academic vocation. In preparation for the seminar, participants will be expected to read a substantial quantity of selected materials on vocation and submit a brief written reflection. In the academic year following the seminar, they will be expected to develop a new course or course materials or to redesign an existing course with greater focus on vocational exploration. The seminar will be held in the central U.S., in order to facilitate participant travel; venue details will be announced later this year.
