Q4 Buy Time and Make Space (10 min)

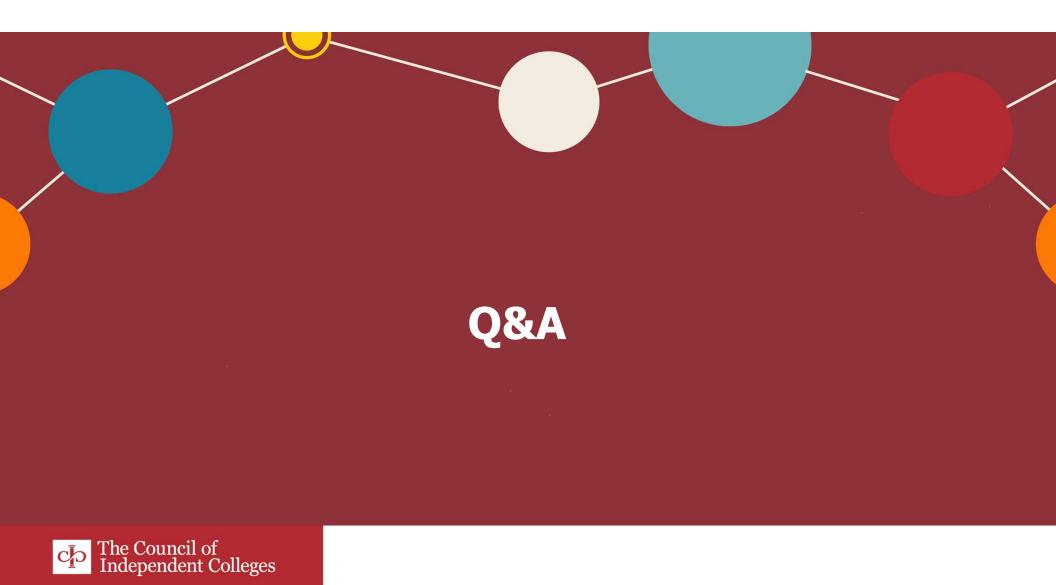
1. How would you buy time? How would you articulate each sides' point of view? How would you maximize positive versus negative interactions?
